From Your Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I don't know about you, but I really enjoy eating. I enjoy all kinds of food: Mexican, Chinese, KFC, pizza, pasta, and good ole' meat and potatoes. Every meal also gives us an opportunity to think about our God. He is the One who made all the different people groups that have come up with all kinds of delicious cuisine. He is the One who created all the plants and animals, spices and oils and the like that we use to cook our meals. He is the One who provides us with nourishment so that we can continue to live our lives in productive ways.




March Hymn of the Month: #641 You Satisfy the Hungry Heart

Sharing God's Bounty

What Have I Done for Him?

Lent is a season in the church year during which we particularly focus on the sacrifice Jesus made for us to pay the debt we owed for our sin. We know there is no way we can pay the debt ourselves. Only the sinless Son of God could do that. We have access to heaven only by grace through faith in Christ Jesus.

While we cannot repay Jesus for what he has done for us, his love does require a response. Paul, speaking of our ministry of reconciliation, wrote, "For Christ's love compels us . . ." (2 Corinthians 5:14). We remain on earth to carry out the tasks which Christ left for us to do: to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit the prisoner, (Matthew 25:31-46). James admonished us that ". . . faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17). We provide the funds that support our pastors, teachers, and missionaries. Again, we can quote Paul writing in 1 Corinthians 9:11-12. "If we have sown spiritual seed among you, is it too much if we reap a material harvest from you? If others have this right of support from you, shouldn't we have it all the more?" Certainly each of us is addressed by the Great Commission: "Go and make disciples of all nations . . ." (Matthew 28:19). The following words from Frances Ridley Havergal are a poignant reminder that Christ's love and sacrifice for us require a response:

Thy life was given for me, Thy Blood, O Lord, was shed That I might ransomed by, and quickened from the dead. Thy life was given for me, What have I given for Thee?

And Thou hast brought to me Down from Thy home above Salvation full and free, Thy pardon and Thy love.

Great gifts Thou broughtest me, What have I brought to Thee?

We are saved by grace through faith for works. Let us pray for the desire to be good stewards of the gifts of salvation, health and wealth, and time and opportunity which God has given us that we might have a part in the furthering of God's kingdom.

We need not give up the pleasures and luxuries of this life. God does not call us to be ascetics, but he does call us to a right sense of proportion in administering our substance.

The question is: "If I have this for myself, then what should I do for God?" This is the question into which the whole matter of stewardship resolves itself.

"Yield"

"Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up." James 4:10

What does it mean to yield? In traffic, we yield by allowing another vehicle have priority and go ahead. In life, we yield by humbling ourselves and giving priority to another. In faith, we yield by submitting to God's will.

Read the book of Jonah. "Now the Lord provided a huge fish to swallow Jonah, and Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights." Jonah 1:17 This story teaches us about the importance of yielding to God's will.

God has a plan for us that requires our obedience.

STOP: Read Jonah 1:1-16; Jonah 3:1-5; Jonah 4:5-11, and consider how God made Jonah yield to His plan.

God is compassionate and forgives and grants us "second chances" as He did with Jonah.

SLOW: When were you skeptical of God's plan for your life? How did you react in that situation? Were you given a second chance?

What danger do we face if we don't yield when God speaks? What do you suppose would happen if we listen and yield? What is God trying to tell you today about His plan for you?

God wants his Word spread to ALL people.

GO: Do you know someone personally who is resisting God's plan? Consider how you might be a small voice and encourage him/her to yield to God's plan? Share your life experiences of a time when you resisted God's plan and when you yielded to His plan.

Words from Jesus: "If anyone loves me, he will obey my teaching. My father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him." John 14:23

But for that very reason I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his immense patience as an example for those who would believe in him and receive eternal life. Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen."

"Why are we here?" While we could answer it in any number of ways, we're usually asked it in the sense of

"Why are you in Taiwan in that big building?" There have been some days I've asked myself the same thing!



The building in which we live is owned by our Taiwan partner church, the China Evangelical Lutheran Church (CELC). When we were looking for a new location for our regional headquarters, they were willing to allow us rent-free use of the building in southern Taiwan. Every once in a while, we have to take a step back and be grateful for our blessings, and ensure we're using them faithfully.

One of the most poignant "Why are you here" moments came when I met Paul. He's the father of a young lady who attends church with us at the local congregation, and he brought his wife and son over to meet with

me one day at our building in Chiayi. Paul isn't Taiwanese; he's Korean. But he came to Taiwan many decades ago as a self-appointed missionary to the Taiwanese people. He married a Taiwanese woman, and has been here ever since.

Paul came to visit me because he had noticed a difference lately: our building was finally being used, after having been vacant for many years. He had heard from his daughter that a bunch of missionaries had moved in, and were planning to use it for theological education and training of people in the Scriptures. He was amazed to see that I was a pastor, and I was able to confirm for him all the rumors he had heard. We were indeed building a center for theological education, and planned to train Lutherans so they could plant churches in Taiwan and all throughout the Chinese-speaking world.



Paul could hardly contain his joy. As it turns out, he had ridden by our building on his bicycle just about every day for most of his life. And as he rode by these last few years, he had prayed that the Lord would use this building, once built with plans to be a seminary, to be used once again in service to the Word of God. Paul prayed that people would use the building to train pastors and church workers, to enable the planting of churches and the proclamation of the Gospel. And in Paul's eyes, LCMS Asia setting up shop here was just the answer his prayers had been seeking.

The building doesn't belong to us, and we only occupy part of it; the bottom floors are to be rented out to local businesses and residences, and we hope to have it flush with students in good time. God grant that to happen, and for us always to remember that this is *His* work. Let us be good stewards of the time and resources entrusted to us all. Thank you for letting us be here to play these roles as He sees fit. **


