
the sky, how much more will God provide for you?

Thursday Morning Bible Study - Thursdays at 10am in the Fellowship Hall





Sharing God's Bounty

Living for Jesus

German Theologian Martin Luther said, "If someone would knock on my heart and ask, 'Who lives here?' I would say, 'Martin Luther once lived here, but he has moved out and Jesus has moved in.' "In Galatians 2:20 the apostle Paul wrote that he, too, lived for Jesus. "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God."

Who or what do you live for? If we live for ourselves and the things of the world, we will focus our attention and energy on amassing more and more things. It is easy for money and possessions to become overly important because our society tells us that more is better and that happiness and success can only be achieved by having the newest and best things. To find happiness and success, we work long and hard.

King Solomon, who was wealthy and wise, tried almost everything and found no satisfaction with things of the world. In Ecclesiastes, he tells us that he tried wine and women; he built houses, gardens, and parks; he bought slaves, herds and flocks, and amassed silver and gold. "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure . . . Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 2:10-11). Regarding money, Solomon wrote, "Whoever loves money never has money enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with his income. This too is meaningless" (vs. 5:10).

In closing the book of Ecclesiastes, Solomon wrote, "Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this the whole duty of man. For God will bring every deed into judgment . . ." (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14). The only thing that finally gave Solomon's life purpose was living for God. Likewise, we as Christians understand that Jesus is the only person who can give us lasting peace, comfort, and security. He alone meets our needs. Jesus' tremendous sacrifice showed us his love for us and his love compels us to love him and live for him. Filled with Jesus' presence in our lives, we are empowered to overcome the pull of the world.

Christian Stewards do not dedicate their time, their talent, or their treasure so that they may become God's, but because they are God's.



Raising up children in the faith is a high priority for the Lutheran Church of Uganda. One way they do this is through the ministry at the Lutheran schools. Another is through Sunday School.

Hope Lutheran Church in Bufuula began a Sunday School program this month to reach out to the many young children in the congregation and community. It is a blessing to walk alongside them as they begin this new ministry.

Parents in the congregation are thankful that their young children can learn God's message of salvation by grace through faith from an early age. This is an opportunity many of the adults in the Lutheran church did not have, as the Lutheran Church of Uganda is only about 25 years old. Now, while the parents are in Bible study with the vicar on Sunday morning, their children can also be studying God's Word in Sunday School in the room next door.

God is also working through the Sunday School ministry to share the Gospel with non-Christians and unchurched families in the community. Some of the children who live nearby come to Sunday school, and even stay for the worship service afterward, without their parents. We pray that as the Holy Spirit works through the Word in the hearts of the children, He will also embolden them to witness to others.

This is in fact the story of one of our Sunday School teachers. Miriam did not grow up in a Christian family. However, she lived near the Lutheran church, and she started attending church and Sunday school when she was still young. It was there that she first learned about the love of Jesus and the salvation He won for her. Now she is helping to teach the next generation about our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Please keep the students and Sunday school teachers in your prayers. Pray that the Holy Spirit may work mightily through His Word to raise this next generation in the faith. Pray that they, too, may share the wonders God has done for generations to come.

LEARNING IN THE CHURCH

It is a blessing to serve alongside the Lutheran Church of Uganda (LCU) and to see the way God is working through them to grow His kingdom. He has raised up pastors and lay leaders who faithfully preach His Word and train people up in the faith throughout the nearly 140 congregations of the LCU. While my primary place of service is in Bufuula, I always appreciate opportunities to visit and encourage other congregations, as well. This month I was able to worship with our brothers and sisters in Christ in the village of Ikumbya in the Eastern deanery. Drums play an important role in the music throughout Uganda. They are not only used in traditional music, but they are also often used in church to accompany the hymns and offer praise to God. In this region, the drums are most often played in a set of three, as pictured below. I continue to thank God for the gift of music and an opportunity to learn about the culture in a special way.

It is only because we have the support of the local church, and the permission of the government, that we are able to live outside the USA to accomplish our work. This fact was driven home again over the last few weeks as we returned to the US for the necessities of life overseas. The Ferry Family was back in "the States" while we renewed passports for the four older kids, and assembled the documentation for our Taiwan visa applications.



Chinese, and the rest of the visit went very smoothly. Two weeks later, we had our passports back in hand with the fresh resident visas pasted in the middle. Thanks be to God!

The Ferry family is now back in Asia, unpacking our suitcases in our new home, and excited to get back to work. We still have some diplomatic tasks to accomplish to obtain our resident cards, but the hard part is over. Many thanks to each of you for your continued prayers, support, and love. We are humbled to begin this new chapter of service in earnest, and we look forward to sharing the updates and pictures.
